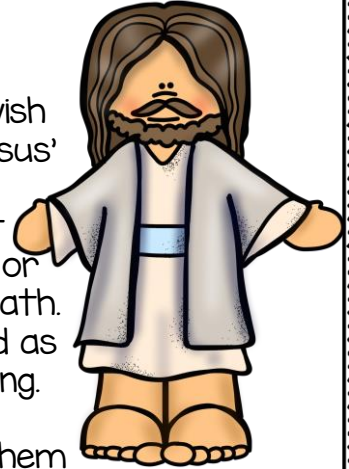


# CHRISTIANITY

## Jesus Christ

Christianity is traced back to the birth, ministry, death, and resurrection of Jesus Christ. Jesus was born into a humble Jewish family over 2000 years ago in Palestine, now known as Israel. Jesus' mother was a young peasant named Mary. Christians believe Jesus' father is the Holy Spirit of God, making Jesus human, but also divine. Jesus' earliest followers believed he was the Messiah, or messenger, sent by God to free people from slavery, sin, and death. They felt Jesus was sent so people could better understand God as a caring and loving parent. Jesus lived as a human among suffering. He healed sick people and told stories, known as parables. Jesus preached sermons to people to teach them what God wanted them to do. He taught them to love with all their hearts and love their neighbors like themselves. Jesus led by example, loving and forgiving others. He especially focused on people who were considered outcasts in society.



## Crucifixion

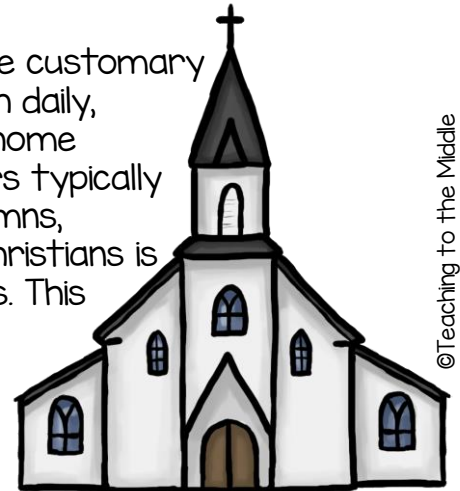
Jesus had a loyal following led by his twelve disciples, but he also had enemies. Powerful leaders were threatened by Jesus' following. The Roman governor sentenced Jesus to death and had him crucified. After Jesus was dead for three days, his followers found his empty tomb and realized he had been raised from the dead. Christians believed Jesus sacrificed himself on the cross to show how much God loves his people. Jesus paid for the sins of the world by giving his life. Christians believe God's message of love and forgiveness showed God offers salvation for all his people. After Jesus was resurrected, his followers spread his message around the world and created the Christian Church. There are about two billion Christians living in the world today.

## Holy Trinity

Christians believe in the Trinity, or the three parts of God: God the father or Creator, God the Son (Jesus) or Redeemer, and God the Holy Spirit (God's presence in the world).

## Sacred Places

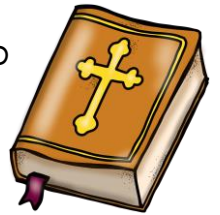
Christians worship in churches. The sabbath is Sunday, the customary day to worship in Christianity. Some people attend church daily, especially monks and nuns. Most Christians also pray at home through individual or family devotions. Priests or ministers typically lead Church services. They usually consist of prayers, hymns, readings, and a sermon. The primary service for most Christians is known as the Holy Eucharist, or Holy Communion or Mass. This service focuses on sharing bread and wine, representing Christ's body and blood, sacrificed for God's people on Earth. The Holy Eucharist is modeled by Jesus' last meal with his disciples, known as the Last Supper. Jesus



instructed his disciples to share bread and wine together at this meal as a way of remembering him. Christians were often persecuted in the early days of Christianity, so the first churches were usually people's homes or other safe gathering places. The secret sign of a fish indicated where Christians would meet. There are many types of Christian churches today, but they often share some common features that date back to the churches of the Middle Ages. Some of the common features include: a bell tower, nave or seating area, altar used to hold the Bible and bread and wine for Communion, pulpit for sermons, lectern loft or seating for the choir, stained glass windows, candles or incense burners, a precious cross over or on the altar, and a baptismal font that holds water. Churches are typically built with the best a community has to offer as a way to show respect and praise God. Churches are meant to inspire people to worship.

## Sacred Texts

The Holy Bible is the sacred text of Christianity. There are two parts to the Christian Bible: The Old Testament and the New Testament. The Old Testament is mainly the Hebrew scriptures of Jesus' time. The New Testament has writings about Jesus Christ and the early church. There are four gospels, meaning "good news," of the New Testament that are accounts of Jesus' life and teachings, and his death and resurrection. The Acts of the Apostles are included in the New Testament describing the early growth of the Christian church. The letters of Paul and other important leaders are described. In addition, also the Letter to the Hebrews and the Book of Revelation are in the New Testament. This part of the Bible teaches that salvation comes through believing in the death and resurrection of Jesus Christ and following his teachings. Christians are taught salvation is a gift God extends freely through Jesus to all of his people.

# Christian Celebrations



Christian celebrations center around important days in Jesus' life.

**The Advent** is the four week season of preparation for the birth of Jesus. An Advent wreath is used as a focus for prayer during this time.



**Christmas** celebrates Jesus' birth. It is often celebrated with nativity scenes, stories, and pageants to recall the story of Jesus' birth.

**Epiphany** celebrates the visit of three wise men to Jesus after his birth and their spreading of the good news of his birth throughout the world.

**Lent** is the period leading up to Easter commemorating the forty days Jesus spent in the desert fasting and praying.

**Holy Week** is the last week of Jesus' life, including Palm Sunday celebrating Jesus' entry into Jerusalem the week before his crucifixion.



**Maundy Thursday** is a remembrance of the Last Supper and Good Friday commemorates the day Jesus was crucified on the cross, the most recognized symbol of Christianity.

**Easter** celebrates Jesus' resurrection from the dead. Eggs symbolize new life. Flowers often cover crosses to symbolize Jesus' victory over death.

**Ascension Day** celebrates the day Jesus ascended into Heaven.

**Saints' Days** are official days recognized by many Christians, especially Catholic, Orthodox, and Anglican. They celebrate people have lived particularly holy lives and are recognized by the church as saints.
